Chalmers Heads School Board

David Chalmers, president of the Board of Education won the largest number of votes in the recent school board election. This new school board, the first since Conrad's split with Dickinson, will take over on July 1.

Mr. Chalmers will serve for a five-year term. Others elected were J. Raymond Frederic, Clifford Stelle, John Dillman, and George Haney. Mr. Stelle and Mr. Haney will be serving on the board for the first time.

The school tax rate for next year will remain the same as the previous year, 16 1/2 cents for current expenses and 8 1/2 cents for debt service.

The data processing for scheduling, attendance and progress reporting will be continued next year. This processing will cost about \$3.30 per pupil.

Teachers Plan Vacations Now

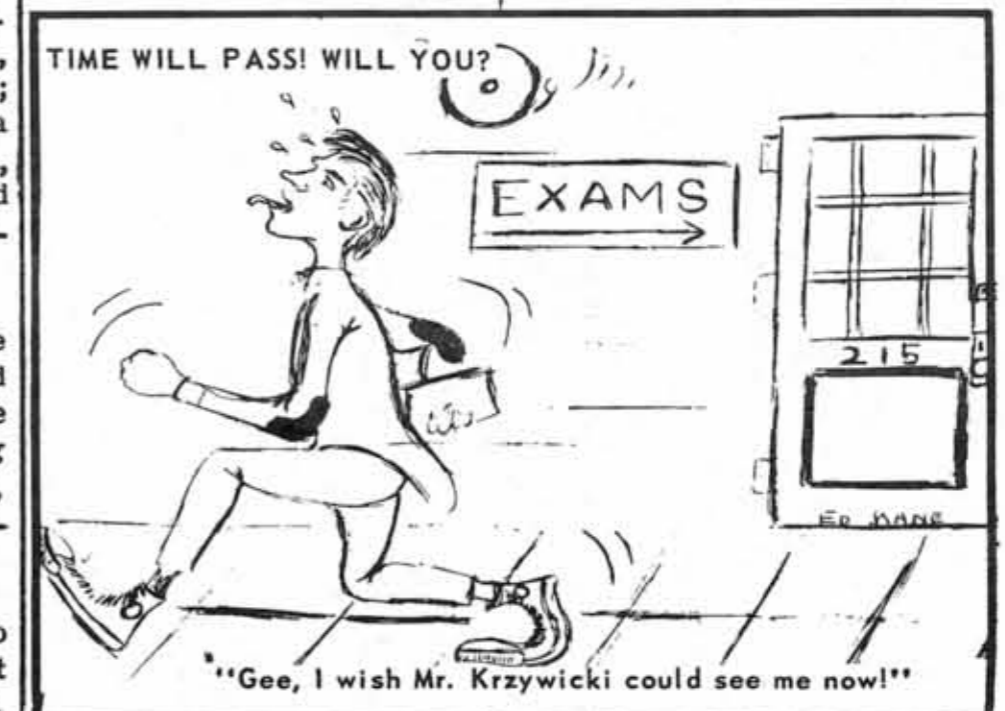
Do teachers really spend the summer dreaming up ideas to make their courses rough or, do they spend their vacations as you and I?
